MINUTE M11/2018: INCREASE IN THE RATE OF CUSTOMS DUTY ON WHEAT AND WHEATEN FLOUR IN TERMS OF THE EXISTING VARIABLE TARIFF FORMULA

In terms of the recently reviewed variable tariff formula for wheat, the customs duty on wheat is calculated as the difference between the domestic reference price for wheat of US\$279.00/ton and the current 3-week moving average US No. 2 HRW (ord) Gulf settlement price for wheat. Adjustments to the level of protection are effected when the difference between the current 3-week moving average price and the 3-week moving average price on which the last duty triggered was calculated, amounts to more than US\$10/ton for 3 consecutive weeks. The resulting Dollar duty will be converted to Rand, based on the Rand/Dollar exchange rate prevailing on the day that the adjustment is triggered and subsequently adjusted with the latest available Real Effective Exchange Rate Index as published by the South African Reserve Bank.

The International Trade Administration Commission of South Africa (ITAC) considers adjustments in the customs duty on wheat, once the conditions for adjustment are met.

In terms of the recently reviewed and approved variable tariff formula for wheat, conditions for an upward adjustment in the tariff were met and the South African Grain Information Service (SAGIS) forwarded a letter of confirmation to this effect.

Wheat pricing information, confirmed by the South African Grain Information Service (SAGIS), indicated that conditions for an upward adjustment in the customs duty were met on 11 September 2018, when the 3-week moving average of the US No. 2 HRW (ord) Gulf settlement price for wheat triggered an adjustment at US\$241.00/ton. The corresponding Rand/US Dollar (R/US\$) exchange rate was R15.0510 to US\$1.00. If the domestic reference price, the 3-week moving average price, the R/US\$ exchange rate on 11 September 2018 and the latest available Real Effective Exchange Rate (REER) Index as published by the South African Reserve Bank (0.8580 for June 2018) are applied to the formula, the customs duty on wheat needs to be adjusted upward from 29.85c/kg to 49.07c/kg.

As the customs duty on wheaten flour is set in the form of a specific duty at the level of 150% of the rate applicable to wheat, the customs duty on wheaten flour also needs to be increased from 44.77c/kg to 73.61c/kg.

In light of the above, the Commission recommends that the rate of customs duty on wheat and wheaten flour, classifiable under tariff headings 1001.9 and 1101.00, be increased from 29.85c/kg and 44.77c/kg to 49.07c/kg and 73.61c/kg, respectively.
